Elle Magazine's Women in Tech Dinner Reaches for the Superstars

There are networking events, and there are fashion events, and rarely the twain shall meet... unless you were meeting at the the first-ever Elle Magazine Women in Tech dinner at Quince Restaurant. Celebrating the X-chromosomes of tech leaders and changemakers profiled in the magazine's July issue, the evening honored thirteen distinguished women at the top of their game in both function and form. These women were bold, bright, beautiful, and badass in the very best sense, an unstoppable force of femininity and feminism that coalesced the glamorous group of Silicon Valley and San Francisco powerhouse guests into a temporary sorority on steroids.

As host of the evening sponsored by Verizon, Elle Editor-in-Chief Robbie Myers adroitly attended to the thirteen honorees, and ensured that introductions were made all around. If you need to crowdfund your concept, go get Danae Ringelmann, founder of Indiegogo. If you want to grab a byte from an engineer with 1.46 million Twitter followers, find Padmasree Warrior, CTO and Chief Strategy Officer at Cisco Systems. Danika Laszuk of Jawbone can set you up with the latest wearable technology, Sarah Friar of Square can create a whole new credit category, and Caterina Fake can serve up startups like Findery, Flickr, and Hunch. Although many of the honorees and guests had only met that evening, it did not deter a rapid-fire download of meta-data about what mattered: how to get more women enrolling in engineering institutions, how to negotiate VC funding, how to get changed for a fancy dinner in an airport bathroom, which Kleiner Perkins' Juliet de Baubigny had just done just prior. And because these were women at the top of their game, they didn't shy away from the really big questions: handling difficult shareholders, managing multiple mentorships, and finding drop-dead shoes that don't make your feet numb.

No topic was off the exquisitely set table, thoughtfully equipped with ipads containing bios of the honorees and detailed descriptions of Chef Michael Tusk's exquisitely refined dinner, a test for even the most diet-conscious: tomato fantasia with herbs and basil gelee, lobster-corn risotto, a choice of wild seabass or spring lamb, and a Mars-worthy red planet of a dessert that used glassblowing techniques to render a perfect sugar sphere containing rose, lychee and berry cream. Guests lingered over cappuccino to exchange ideas, ID's and Instagrams, Tweeting and tagging one another like it was schoolyard recess. It was an unusual night in the Valley, and nobody wanted to disband the temporary girl group of stars that Elle Magazine had put at the top of the charts.

Not counting such high-profile femmes as Yahoo CEO Marissa Mayer and Facebook COO Sheryl Sandberg, the top jobs in tech remain the domain of the geeky XY chromosomes.

But Elle Editor in Chief Robbie Myers is sure that balance is shifting. And to prove that point, she's published the inaugural Women







in Tech Power List, which debuts in the July issue.

But first, there was a party June 18 to celebrate these 13 talented women at Quince restaurant, where Myers and Elle Publisher Kevin O'Malley partnered with Verizon to host a chef Michael Tusk dinner for 75 female leaders (including actress Rashida Jones, Kleiner Perkins VC Juliet de Baubigny, Silicon Valley Bank CMO Michelle Draper and Facebook Strategic Partnerships manager Libby Leffler) and one very good lensman, photographer Douglas Friedman.

Dr. Carolyn Chang found the social aspect of the fete inspiring.

"I love meeting so many new, dynamic women," she said. "And it turns out, 'Valley Girl'

Jesse Draper and I are on the same National Geographic special in August."

Leading this year's list: Intel Labs' VP Genevieve Bell; Findery founder-CEO Caterina Fake, Square CFO Sarah Friar, Jawbone VP Danika Laszuk, Y Combinator co-founder Jessica Livingston, Code for America founder Jennifer Pahlka, Indiegogo co-founder Danae Ringelmann, SpaceX President-COO Gwynne Shotwell, Re/code co-foundereditor Kara Swisher, Cisco CTO Padmasree Warrior, Pixels IO founder Grace Woo and One Kings Lane co-founders Susan Feldman and Alison Pincus.

"These are women who are not only bringing us the culture of tech, they are remaking the culture of tech," toasted Myers. "The ladies are its creators."

Yet they're not just pushing product. Friar, CFO of Square, also believes in adding value to community around her.

"We just moved to Mid-Market, next door to Twitter. And every Friday, we volunteer in the area," she said. "That was Jack's (co-founder **Jack Dorsey**) idea for us to work against the 'Broken Window Theory.'

Gala gals: Down in Atherton, Lisa Goldman convened her power posse (Staci Cole, Rachael Bowman, Calla Griffith, Nicole Curran) to host Summer Soiree, an alfresco fete on her oak-tree-dotted grounds, where San Francisco Symphony supporters rallied in advance of their opening-night gala.

Reveling in the warm summery night, guests supped on a McCalls cocktail buffet as the hipster Hot Pockets band serenaded poolside.

"Lisa is so smart," marveled Patrons' Dinner co-chair Eliza Cash of her gala chairwoman.

"Half our committee is from San Francisco, half from Silicon Valley. And we've sold more
\$100K tables than ever before."

Indeed, Goldman has been dazzling with her duties - a few weeks ago, she delivered delish mini cakes to publicize the Sept. 3 gala that stars **Bonnie Raitt**, pianist **Yuja Wang** and celebrates the 20th anniversary of maestro **Michael Tilson Thomas**.

Gala proceeds benefit the Symphony's free music education programs for Bay Area students. The Patrons' Dinner is *thisclose* to sold out. But tickets for the Symphony and Symphonix Suppers (held at City Hall) remain, and operators are standing by.
